Over two hundred and fifty people are or have been members of the Club. A number have died, some on the mountains, some from the scourge of cancer, others from old age. In this chapter they are all remembered. There have been many other friends associated with the Club, people who never quite got round to joining, and they too figure in the story.

I would like to extend my grateful thanks to those who have read through sections of the history and offered helpful suggestions; to those who over the years have written articles for Club magazines and thus provided a rich store of information and memories; and to those who have helped in many other ways. Any quotes not attributed to members writing in the various magazines or elsewhere are from my personal diaries.

Finally I would like to thank Les Fowles for, among many things, reading the final manuscript; Hilary Cooper for the Index; Richard Kinsman for his help with the printing; and Fred Heywood for his help with the illustrations and in many other ways. So there it is. I can only appeal to readers to judge the book as a whole. I hope you enjoy it.

ABOUT THE CLUB AND ITS NAME

Gwydyr (possibly from *Gwaed Erw*, Bloody Land) is a prominent proper name in the Betwsy-Coed area. Gwydir Castle, 16th century home of the tyrannical Sir John Wynne of Gwydir, lies in the Conwy valley just opposite Llanrwst. The name also occurs, although with a slightly different spelling, in Gwydyr Forest, Y Gwydyr, the pub at Dolwyddelan, and the Gwydyr Hotel at Betws-y-Coed, after which the Club was named at random when passing one winter's day in 1967. "Mountain" rather than "Mountaineering" was chosen largely at the instigation of Bruce Jensen, the Club's first President, who thought that while there was no doubt that the Club's major activity would be mountaineering in all its forms, nevertheless using "Mountain" would cast a broader net and involve people who liked wild places for whatever reason. Hence the famous first line of the constitution, unaltered to this day:

"The Club shall be known as the Gwydyr Mountain Club and shall exist to promote an interest in mountains and activities thereupon".

The Club was founded on March 7th 1967 and soon thrived. It now owns a substantial property at Capel Curig which provides an excellent base for both mountaineering and social activities. The Club is a mountaineering club in the broadest sense of the term: it welcomes everyone from gentle hillwalkers to climbers with ambitions for the Alps and further afield. There is an annual Meets Programme, based roughly on fortnightly meets with every other one being at Capel Curig; there are also a large number of "off-programme" events organised by smaller groups as well as a number of social events during the year. The Club meets every Tuesday at the Crown Hotel in Birkenhead and new members are welcome at any time.
