# Saturday Walk on 9 January - Llangollen by Dave Gray

There were 9 of us on this trip - Helen Avison, Milly, Dave Antrobus, Dave Chadwick, Ray, John Simpson, Chris Harris and Paul Sinclair plus myself. Dave Chadwick came along to the meet by bike and train.



We were lucky to get a 'weather window' of bright sunny conditions for most of the walk, and it stayed dry till 45 minutes before the end which must be a record for winter 2015/16!

We went from Berwyn Station over Moels Gamelin, y Gaer and Morfydd and then back down by Cymmo and Llantisilio. Velvet Hill got missed out of the grounds of time and that the ground under it would most likely be flooded, which it was.

Not only did we see the sun (!) we also saw intermittent views of distant snowy peaks - Arenig Fawr and the main Berwyn ridge, and also got good views east to Eglwyseg Crags and down to a very full River Dee.

Per Dave Chadwick's GPS this was 9.1 miles and 3,244 feet of ascent in the day, so a fair bit of up and down.


