1) Tree felling at the chapel - by Chris Harris



Before

Friday the 1st of September 2022 was a historic day at the chapel. The two much loved/hated ash trees at the entrance to the carpark were felled. They are victims of Ash Dieback, whilst not too badly affected, the proximity of the power lines leading to the chapel meant that they needed to be disconnected before work could be done. I had managed to establish that the trees were actually not on our land but they were on the bridleway which has been adopted by Conwy C.C.. I contacted Ancaster estates to work out who was responsible for their care. They accepted responsibility and also agreed to fell the two trees outside the kitchen, by the stream, as they were overhanging the chapel roof (I pointed out that one of Ancaster's trees had already damaged the toilet block). The tree at the end of the car park near the stream was badly affected by Ash Dieback and although it was definitely on our land Ancaster said they would take that down. A little further downstream on Ancaster land there was another badly diseased ash tree which was felled.



After

Eight am on the day, the Manweb, the tree surgeons, John Driver and I were on site.

John has been liaising with Rhydian Roberts, the Snowdonia Park Authority's Woodlands Officer, and needed to ensure that we were complying with Park regulations. He also was useful with technical terms such as "brash" and "Husqy".

Manweb oversaw sight safety as people numbers had to be counted and arrivals and departures accounted for. Power to the chapel was quickly disconnected.

Friday saw the removal of the two trees at the carpark entrance



The rest of the trees took until 7.30pm on the Monday to come down. Fortunately John stayed over the weekend and beyond as there was a lot of clearing of timber, he also took the opportunity to tidy the rest of the chapel garden.

There is still the issue of the stumps at the entrance to the carpark. One can be removed with a stump grinder, the other is embedded in stone so needs a JCB to pull it out. John is overseeing this operation. We should then have a much wider carpark entrance and hopefully a bit of extra parking space.

Rhydian has said that he would like to see native species planted to replace the felled trees, eg Oak, ash beech, sycamore, birch, cherry, hazel, alder, rowan, hawthorn and holly.

2) Sychnant pass walk - article by Chris Harris

Dave Antrobus was leading and we (10) met at the Sychnant pass car park.

The walk was titled "Lost civilisations on Tal y Fan." We walked South along the Cambrian Way to the summit of Tal y Fan with a detour to see the Llangelynnin old church (pictured). The church is near Garnedd-Wen, if you look on the OS map.

The total distance was just short of 10 miles, with ascent of 2,400ft.

It's an area many of us had not walked before but is significant in that it is the bit between pass of 2 Stones and Conwy Mountain.



3) The Roaches, Saturday 24th September - by Chris Harris

A fine first lead by new member Debbie Kennard. The start was at the Wincle Brewery where there was plenty of free roadside parking and we finished at the brewery in time to enjoy samples of their fine ales.

We followed the Danevalley way then ascended to Lud's Church and followed the board walk through the woods to join the Roaches at the NW end. Walking the Roaches ridge we had views of The Peckforton Hills, and the Wrekin. Wales should have been visible but it was covered in cloud.

A good turn out of 12 with 50:50 male/female.

Just over 10 miles with 1990ft ascent.
